Bookworm Booklet



Concept: Create clever Bookworm booklets for reading and writing fun.

Objective: Whimsical Bookworms are perfect for book reports, reading logs, and and figurative language notes.

Supplies Used: Cardstock or Construction Paper, Colored Pencils or Crayons, Glue, Scissors

Die Cuts used: EL30327-DC (Book, Bookworm)

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. The teacher will die-cut the materials for student use prior to the lesson.
- 2. Die-cut the Bookworm using various colors of cardstock or construction paper. Keep one shape whole and cut away highlights from another to embellish the cover.
- 3. Die-cut the Bookworm using plain or lined paper to create the pages.
- 4. Layer the pages onto the body of the Bookworm and attach. Accordion fold along perforations to close the book (see Main Photo).

Encourage students as they follow the writing process to explore anything from simple sentences to five-paragraph essays. These versatile books can support writing exercises in all major subject areas and current events. The students may be prompted to explore any genre to express ideas. Older students can explore library resources to develop research-based writing. Second language learners can relate to given themes to develop writing skills. Through these books, the teacher can develop a unique classroom library featuring students as authors.
