Superhero Bookmark





Concept: Personalize a decorative bookmark and inspire fun reading throughout the year.

Objective: Design creative bookmarks for library fun to encourage leisure reading.

Supplies Used: Cardstock or Construction Paper, Colored Pens and Pencils, Glue, Ribbon or Yarn, Scissors

Die Cuts used: EL16853-LG (Paper Pal #1 Set), EL29837-LG (Paper Pal Super Hero)

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. The teacher will die-cut the materials for student use prior to the lesson.
- 2. Die-cut the Paper Pal and Paper Pal Super Hero from various colors of cardstock or construction paper. Keep one shape whole and cut highlights from other shapes. Layer and adhere to embellish.
- 3. Die-cut the Plain Bookmark #2 using colored cardstock or construction paper.
- 4. Adhere the embellished Paper Pal onto bookmark shaped cutout. Use a hole ounch to attach a piece of ribbon or yarn to each Bookmark to complete (see Main Photo).

Inspire year-round reading with student-created bookmarks to suit all occasions. Create bookmarks to supplement language arts lessons, reward good behavior and academic performance or celebrate holidays.
